Facing Britain

British documentary photography from the 1960s to the present 20 Feb 2022–01 May 2022

Opening: Sunday, 20 Feb 2022, 11:30am

Queen Elizabeth's platinum jubilee, parties in 10 Downing Street, Prince Andrew's abuse scandal, Brexit and Megxit: Great Britain is dominating the headlines. From mainland Europe, the rest of the continent looks with both admiration and worry to a country that has cut ties with the European Union after almost fifty years of membership.

But how do the Brits see their country? The exhibition *Facing Britain* paints a picture of the United Kingdom from the perspective of 44 British photographers – a picture that stays away from clichés and motifs disseminated by the mass media. Featuring around 250 works from 1963–2020, it presents the first overview of British documentary photography. The time period encompasses the UK's membership of the EU and its predecessor as well as Brexit. In addition to works by internationally acclaimed artists such as Martin Parr, the exhibition will spotlight long forgotten and only recently rediscovered positions such as those by John Myers, Tish Murtha and Peter Mitchell. The 1970s and 1980s will form a focal point. It was during these decades that artistic documentary photography grew in significance.

The photographers have aimed their gaze at people's everyday lives, their habits, their surroundings, their pleasures and moments of relaxation; but they also depict social conflicts and political unrest. The pictures document the decline of the Midlands, a region dominated by coal mines and the steel industry, as well as the Thatcher era with the Falklands War and the current divisive upheaval that is Brexit. Questions about gender and migration are reflected particularly strongly in the pictures taken by the younger photographers.

In addition to pictures of urban landscapes and scenes of everyday life, portraits are one of the central threads of the exhibition. From children to teenagers and old people, these pictures convey much of the charm, eccentricity and humour as well as the much-cited relaxed nature of the residents of the British Isles. The often-moving photographs all communicate deep affection and humanity as well as love of country.
